## IC acquires land

## "Immediate growth": Dean

EDMOND—On November 7, the Church closed a real estate transaction for 10 acres of land adjacent to the already-owned Spurlin 40 acres and the 120-acre IC campus.

The land purchase is an "exciting" development, according to Dean of Students

Stephen Flurry, "because it provides immediate growth to the college."

What makes the growth immediate is that the 10 acres came with a 2,200-square-foot house, a steel barn and a fenced corral.


Thus, the property will serve many purposes, according to PCG Chief Operating Officer Andrew Locher. A portion of the acreage may be divided into additional lots for faculty housing in the future. This addition will provide a third gated entrance from Bryant Avenue to the campus and faculty row.

Also, the new land will provide additional space for the agricultural

program. The existing horse corral on the new property will house the PCG's horse and llama. Mr. Flurry said that in

the future, he hopes to have a few head of cattle in the corral to supply beef for the college. He also said that the steel barn on the new acreage will possibly be used as a student center or a library in the future.
